Lately I have been looking at how things have gone over these six months, and it has become apparent that a few course corrections are needed. This is normal. Things that were well-intentioned don't always turn out the way one hopes or expects. So here goes:

1. It has been brought to my attention that a number of you have been asking why we sing the Psalms in worship. So allow me to share some information with you about that (most of this info is adapted from my metrical psalms website).

The Psalms were written to be sung. Indeed, they are the sung prayerbook of the Jewish people to this day. The superscriptions which appear at the beginning of many of the Psalms in the Bible indicate they are directed to the "choirmaster." Sometimes tune names are given. A few psalms carry the attribution "of the sons of Korah," which was the musician division of the tribe of Levi.

The psalms also have long been sung in the Christian tradition. Monks and nuns chant them. Other traditions sing them antiphonally (chanting or reading the psalm, with a refrain or antiphon being sung periodically—this is how the psalter in the back of our hymnal is set up). The Protestant Reformers advocated singing the Psalms. In our own United Methodist tradition, I found this quote in the journal of John Wesley, co-founder of the Methodist movement, from November 11, 1738: "...*Saturday,* 11, spent the evening with a little company at Oxford. I was grieved to find prudence had made them leave off singing psalms. I fear it will not stop here. God deliver me, and all that seek Him in sincerity, from what the world calls Christian prudence!" To this day, some Protestant denominations sing nothing but psalms, and others consider them the central piece of their congregational song. These denominations, for the most part, sing metrical psalms.

Metrical psalms are psalms written in a metered, poetic format so they can be set to familiar hymn tunes. The first metrical psalters appeared in Switzerland and France at the time of the Protestant Reformation. To this day, the churches of the Reformed and Presbyterian traditions have been the leading users of metrical psalmody. The first metrical psalter in English, that of Sternhold, was published prior to his death in 1549.

My journey into sung psalmody began in 1985, when I was exposed to singing the psalms at a worship convocation. The varieties of sung psalmody being advocated there were basically chanted and antiphonal. In fact, the workshop instructors had nothing good to say about metrical psalmody! Finding singing an exciting way to use the psalms (certainly more exciting than the dread responsive reading, which only has been used for the Psalms since the late 19<sup>th</sup> century), I brought the idea home and started experimenting with antiphonally sung psalmody in the three small congregations I was serving at the time. The polite feedback I received from them was basically a) this is too difficult for us; b) this feels out-of-sync with our tradition. At this point I began questioning why metrical psalmody was being disparaged. I soon found answers--archaic language, stilted sentence structure, forced rhyme schemes, and since many metrical settings did one stanza for each verse of the psalm, extreme length in many cases. I decided it was time to come up with a modern, understandable metrical version of the psalms. After all, hymns are the dominant song culture of most small membership Protestant churches. Since metrical psalms are set to hymn tunes, I have found these are much more accessible and acceptable to the congregations I have served.

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To do this, I decided to forget rhyming. Hebrew poetry does not rhyme, nor does much contemporary poetry in English. So I began in earnest to write metrical psalm settings for the Common Lectionary. I completed the manuscript in 1987, and published my first book, *Sing the Psalms!*, the following year. Soon after that, the Revised Common Lectionary replaced the Common Lectionary, so a second volume, *Supplementary Volume to Sing the Psalms*, was published to update my first book. Since neither volume sold well, I eventually put my psalm settings on an Internet website (http:// metricalpsalms.homestead.com). I occasionally receive appreciative e-mails about them from clergy and church music leaders from many different denominational traditions all over the world.

I must confess that I have been a bit taken aback by the negative reaction I have received to singing the Psalms in this church. Most of the other congregations I have served, even the ones who were not very musically adept, liked singing them. Woodward UMC is probably the most musically gifted congregation I have ever served, yet it is also the one that has complained the most about it being difficult to sing them, even to familiar hymn tunes. I have been told it would probably be easier if the music was printed with the words, but I do not presently have the capability to make that happen easily. From what I have observed, I don't think chanting would go over well, and I have also been told that using the psalter in the back of the hymnal with the sung antiphons has been tried in the past and was not very successful. And if it isn't already evident, this is something around which I have considerable passion and on which I have expended over 25 years of effort.


So I am not inclined to give up singing the Psalms. However, (here is the course correction) I am open to trying some different ways—and it may be that sometimes the choir or a soloist may sing it instead of the congregation. And we certainly don't have to be limited to what I have written; there is other good material available written in a variety of styles. That's something to be figured out in the weeks to come.

2. The second course correction involves our youth ministry. As you recall, the decision had earlier been made to combine our youth ministry with that of Emmanuel UMC in Granger. The idea made sense in many ways—after all, the young people go to school together, I know I am not the right person to lead a youth group, and Emmanuel has a solid cadre of youth leaders already in place. Our churches already have experience in sharing Holy Week worship services, and I am told that has been a positive experience. But for some reason, sharing youth ministry isn't working. Only one of our young people has been attending youth group at Granger—and this person is a 6<sup>th</sup> grader, meaning none of the youth who were in our youth group last year are participating in the combined effort.

What I have decided to do is take advantage of the new structure and create a volunteer staff position, Youth Ministries Coordinator. The person who accepts this position will be given the responsibility of organizing our youth ministries, with help from others in our church who are interested. My hope and prayer is that this will provide our youth with the fellowship, Christian growth, and opportunities to serve that they need and desire.

3. Related to the second is the Youth Bible Study, which has been meeting on Wednesday afternoons at our church, also done jointly with Emmanuel, and co-led by Pastor Bill Deskin and me. The first time we met, back in September, we had two youth attend, both from Woodward. The second time we had six, three from each church, and had a really good discussion. All of those who attended were middle school age. However, the last three times we were scheduled to meet, no one showed up, except in December one of our young people who already happened to be in the building for another reason

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popped in 45 minutes late and asked if he had missed Bible Study.

We have decided to discontinue the Youth Bible Study for now. If any of our youth have suggestions about how to better connect with them, please contact me.

4. Another part of the course correction is figuring out how to use the new structure in the best way. It now seems best to me to continue the work of many of the programming committees under the old structure by creating volunteer staff positions to be in charge of these. I had already previously decided on this route for Worship, Missions, and Christian Education, and have now added Outreach to that list.

I also discovered that in some cases I have misspoken on the tasks of Nurture, Witness, and Outreach. Rather than continue to misspeak, here is what the 2012 Book of Discipline has to say about these:

"The nurturing ministries of the congregation shall give attention to but not be limited to education, worship, Christian formation, membership care, small groups, and stewardship. Attention must be given to the needs of individuals and families of all ages.

"The outreach ministries of the church shall give attention to local and larger community ministries of compassion, justice, and advocacy. These ministries include church and society, global ministries, higher education and campus ministry, health and welfare, Christian unity and interreligious concerns, religion and race, and the status and role of women.

"The witness ministries of the church shall give attention to developing and strengthening evangelistic efforts of sharing of personal and congregational stories of Christian experience, faith, and service; communications; Lay Servant Ministries; and other means that give expressions of witness for Jesus Christ." (from par. 252.2a-c)

So to connect this with what we currently do: Nurture includes Worship, Christian Education, and Youth Ministries. Outreach includes Missions, as well as the various things we do to connect the congregation with the community. Witness has to do with evangelism and communication.

Please pray that we may find God's direction in these matters. Pastor Dale


One must keep in mind the weather. In the event it is deemed necessary to cancel worship or other church activities on account of the weather, the following media outlets will be notified:
